

* Public Housing Resources for Families in the Valley

Public Housing provides safe, long-term, income-based rental housing for low-income families. Rent is typically calculated as 30% of adjusted household income. Below are local agencies and resources in Maricopa County and surrounding Valley cities.

🔑 Public Housing Authorities in the Valley

1. City of Phoenix Housing Department

- Offers over 1,500 public housing units across Phoenix.
- Includes family communities with on-site support services.

2. Mesa Housing Authority

- Provides public housing for families in Mesa.
- Includes supportive services and referrals for employment/education.

- Manages family public housing and voucher programs.
- Works with families to maintain long-term stability.

Application Process for Public Housing

1. Check Eligibility

- o Income must be at or below 30–50% of Area Median Income (AMI).
- Must be a U.S. citizen or eligible immigrant.
- o Families, elderly, and persons with disabilities are prioritized.

2. Prepare Documents

- Birth certificates and Social Security cards for all household members
- Photo IDs for adults
- o Proof of income (pay stubs, benefits, child support, etc.)
- o Rental history and references

3. Apply Online or In-Person

- Most housing authorities allow online pre-applications.
- Some have limited waitlist openings, check websites regularly.

Application Tips for Families

- Apply to multiple housing authorities to increase your chances.
- Keep all documents ready and organized in a folder.
- Respond quickly to letters/emails from housing authorities to avoid being removed from waitlists.
- Update your contact information immediately if it changes.
- W Be patient, waitlists can be long, but staying active on them is key.
